St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was a wife, mother, widow, and convert to the Catholic faith. Although she endured many trials and tribulations, she always responded to life's demands with love and compassion. Her legacy includes establishing several religious congregations in the United States, one of which is the Sisters of Charity of Saint Elizabeth, sponsors of St. Joseph's Health. She also began the first Catholic girls school in the nation and was the first American-born citizen to be canonized by the Catholic Church.

St. Vincent de Paul

St. Vincent de Paul was a priest who lived in France during the 16th century. Through his priestly service, he was exposed to the suffering and poverty of his time. For St. Vincent, the poor were the very face of God. In response, he dedicated his life to serving the poor. His legacy includes establishing (with the help of St. Louise de Marillac) the Daughters of Charity, whose members are dedicated to serving the poor.

Mother Mary Xavier Mehegan

Mother Mary Xavier Mehegan founded the Sisters of Charity of Saint Elizabeth in 1859. Eight years later, in 1867, she founded then-St. Joseph's Hospital. At the time, Paterson was an industrial city full of immigrants who came seeking employment in the mills and factories. These workers suffered injury and sickness, many of them having no place to go for medical care.

In response to this great need, Mother Xavier sent a small group of sisters to open St. Joseph's Hospital.
